Guidance for updating your records to meet with The Common Reporting Standard (CRS)

What is CRS?

CRS refers to the Common Reporting Standard, developed by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) as a global standard for the Automatic Exchange of Information. The objective of the CRS is to identify clients holding assets in financial accounts outside of their country of tax residence, and requires the Financial Institutions (FIs) maintaining these accounts to provide information on these accounts to their local tax authority. The information will then be passed to the tax authorities in the account holder's country of residence under an exchange agreement.

Pre-existing account holders

As part of the due diligence obligations under the CRS, we are required to review all of the accounts that we maintained at the date the CRS went live ("Pre-existing Accounts") to determine the tax residence and, for entities, the CRS classification of each account holder. The tax residence of an account holder will be based on the following information:
